Dear 4-H Families:

Now that you have enrolled for the 2015-16 4-H year, you may be asking the question "Now what do I do?" The answer varies depending on your role in the 4-H program.

For Project Leaders: You should start by setting a date for your first project meeting. 4-H Project Leaders should plan on leading 4-6 project meetings. You can ask either your club organizational leader or the 4-H office for a list of members enrolled in the project and communicate to them the meeting date, time and place. 4-H project literature to support your work is available free of charge from the UW Extension office. There is also a vast network of resources available on the Internet, as well as our public libraries. If you would like help printing resources online or have any project related questions, contact either Ian or Donna at the 4-H office. We are also your link to the greater University System and in many cases there are resources available beyond 4-H literature like videos and lesson plans.

If you find educational material from books or the internet that you would like to use for your project meeting, we can print these materials at the 4-H office.

4-H Members and Parents: Do you know the name of the 4-H project leader for the projects your son or daughter has enrolled in? If not, ask your club leader and if there is not a project leader for a project they enrolled in, call lan or Donna in the Extension office and we can help you determine if a neighboring club has a project leader that has room for you to participate in their meetings. If there are no project leaders available, think about someone in the community that has skill or experience in this area and ask them if they would consider becoming a 4-H Project Leader. Adults in the community do not have to be certified 4-H project leaders if there is a certified 4-H project leader present at the project meetings.






Providing Thanksgiving Dinners for local families in need



Discount Patterns from Attention 4-H Club **Treasurers & Leaders**

As you are probably aware, keeping good club treasury records is more important than ever. You may have also discovered that it's much easier to keep an accurate, on-going record of income and payments than to try and recreate it later. To get off to a good start this year we strongly urge you to do the followina:

Use the "Club Financial Records" forms found on our website at http://bavfield.uwex.edu/4-h-vouthdevelopment/. If you use the Excel document the math is done for you! Treasurers can type in and save this document to their own computers.

Start your records as of July 1, 2015. July 1, 2015- June 30, 2016 is the period of activity that will need to be audited next year. We need to get in the habit of using these dates.

Treasurers need to work closely with an adult who can help them understand how to do their job and the importance of it to their club as a whole.

Remember that financial records



tell a story about what your club values and supports. Add enough detail to the lines to explain where the money came from or why it was paid out. If money is paid to an individual, tell why (i.e. camp scholarship, reimbursement for supplies, etc.).

We know you are all good stewards of the money in your treasuries and keeping detailed records takes some work, but in the end, remember it teaches us all about handling money and being accountable, life lessons worth learning.

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Teaching Kids to Practice Gratitude

Everyone can benefit from making an effort to practice gratitude every day. These 3 steps can help you start feeling more grateful, and appreciative of the good things in your life:

- 1. Notice good things, look for them, appreciate them.
- 2. Savor, absorb, and really pay attention to those good things.

Express your gratitude to yourself, write it down, or thank someone.

Notice the Good Things in Your Life

Start to notice and identify the things you are grateful for. Tune in to the small everyday details of your life and notice the good things you might sometimes take for granted.

Try these ideas:

Each day, think of 3 things you are grateful for. Nature. People. Community. Shelter. Creature comforts like a warm bed or a good meal. It's amazing what you notice when you focus on feeling grateful.

Start a gratitude journal. Making a commitment to writing down good things each day makes it more likely that we will notice good things as they happen.

Practice gratitude rituals. Some people say grace before a meal. Pausing in gratitude before eating doesn't have to be religious. It's a simple habit that helps us notice and appreciate the blessing of food on the table.

Once you're aware of the blessings of everyday life, the next step is to savor them.

Savor the Feeling of Gratitude

There are moments when you naturally, right then and there, feel filled with gratitude. These are moments

when you say to yourself, "Oh, wow, this is amazing!" or "How great is this!"

Pause. Notice and absorb that feeling of true, genuine gratitude. Let it sink in. Soak it up. Savor your blessings in the moment they happen.

Express Gratitude

Expressing gratitude is more than courtesy, manners, or being polite. It's about showing your heartfelt appreciation. When you thank someone, you're also practicing the first two gratitude skills: you've noticed something good, and you've genuinely appreciated it.



- Family members who care
- A warm coat on a cold, windy morning
- A breathtaking sunset
- · Fresh air on a crisp fall day
- The feeling of sand between my toes on the first day of vacation
- The way my dog greets me when I come home from school
- My friends and they way I feel when I'm with them
- A healthy brain that helps me make sense of those geometry proofs
- A fine-tuned body that helps me play my sport
- A history teacher who always makes the lesson interesting
- The food I'm about to eat, the people who grew or prepared it



Try this:

Show your appreciation to someone who did something nice. Say: "It was really kind of you to...," "It really helped me out when you...," "You did me a big favor when...," "Thank you for listening when...," "I really appreciated it when you taught me...," or "Thank you for being there when...." You also can write your gratitude in a letter.

Express gratitude by doing a kindness. Gratitude might inspire you to return a favor, or act with kindness or thoughtfulness. Or you might see a situation when you can "pay it forward." Hold the door open for the person behind you, even if it means waiting a little longer than you normally would. Do someone else's chores without letting the person find out it was you. Notice how you feel afterward!

Tell the people in your life how you feel, what they mean to you. You don't have to be mushy or over -the-top. We all have our own style. But if you say what you feel in the right tone at the right moment, even a simple, "Mom, good dinner. Thanks!" means a lot.

True gratitude doesn't leave you feeling like you owe other people something — after all, if you've done someone a favor, you probably don't want the person to feel like you expect something back in return. It's all about feeling good and creating a cycle of good.


