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Dear 4-H Families:

September—October 2015

As the youth development program of the Cooperative Extension System of land-grant universities, 4-H is the nation's largest youth development organization, empowering six million young people throughout the United States. The long standing partnership between US Department of Agriculture, land grant universities and county government provides a platform and a wide variety of educational resource and learning opportunities for youth.

Through America's 110 land-grant universities and its Cooperative Extension System, 4-H reaches every corner of our nation—from urban neighborhoods to suburban schoolyards to rural farming communities. With a network of more than 6 million youth, 611,800 volunteers, 3,500 professionals, and more than 25 million alumni, 4-H helps shape youth to move our country and the world forward in ways that no other youth organization can.

Proven Results

The Positive Development of Youth: Comprehensive Findings from the [4-H Study of Positive Youth Development](#) was a decade-long study, completed the Institute for Applied Research in Youth Development at Tufts University helped to document what has been well understood by 4-H members and adult leaders throughout 4-H's rich history.

The report shows that 4-H youth excel beyond their peers. 4-H'ers are about:

- **Four times** more likely to make **contributions to their communities** (Grades 7-12);
- **Two times** more likely to be **civically active** (Grades 8-12);
- **Two times** more likely to make **healthier choices** (Grade 7);
- **Two times** more likely to participate in **Science, Engineering and Computer Technology programs** during out-of-school time (Grades 10 – 12); and
- 4-H girls are **two times** more likely (Grade 10) and nearly **three times** more likely (Grade 12) to take part in **science programs** compared to girls in other out-of-school time activities.

Lead by Example:

The caring support of adult volunteers and mentors inspires young people in 4-H to work collaboratively, take the lead on their own projects and set and achieve goals with confidence. 4-H'ers chart their own course, explore important issues and define their place in the world. 4-H'ers stand up for themselves and their communities.

These pivotal experiences build a foundation of leadership and skills for success in their future careers.

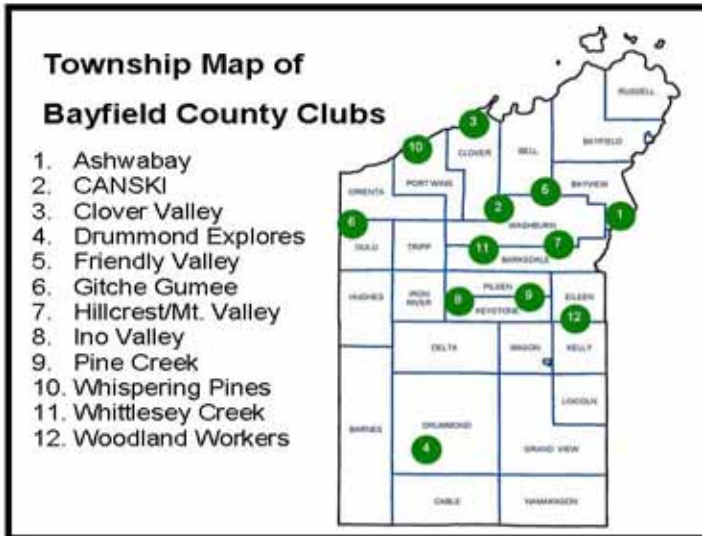
Cloverbud Judging at the Fair

Top off the night with a special celebration where 10 people will be inducted into the Wisconsin 4-H Hall of Fame. An evening of circle dancing and table games will follow the celebration. register.

Check out these yummy recipes prepared by this year's participants!



Pollock Fillets

Pollock is a white-meat fish with a strong, fishy flavor and scent. It is an inexpensive, versatile alternative to other white-meat fish such as tilapia, cod and haddock. A 3-ounce fillet, which is one serving, has 78 calories, 17 grams of protein and less than 1 gram of fat.

Bake

Pollock's flaky texture takes particularly well to breading. Baking breaded Pollock eliminates the need to use fatty, calorie-laden oil. An egg white, at just 17 calories, is a simple, low-calorie adhesive for the bread crumbs. Use plain, fresh bread crumbs; commercial varieties often have excess sodium. Simple seasonings such as ground black pepper and paprika are perfect for flavoring the breading. Either bread the Pollock fillets whole or mince them and form them into balls first. Lining the baking sheet with parchment prevents sticking and helps crisp the breading.

Ingredients:

Banana
Vanilla yogurt (or flavor of your choice)
Granola

Directions:

Cut the banana in half. Dip the banana in yogurt and roll it in the granola. Freeze for a minimum of 1 hour.

Fruit Ice Cream

This is a healthy version of ice cream! Four ingredients only!!!

Ingredients:

2 bananas, cut into 1-inch slices, frozen
1/2 cup frozen strawberries, sliced
2 Tbsp. almond milk
1/2 tsp. vanilla

Instructions:

1. Place banana slices on a plate, separating each slice. Place slices in freezer for 2 hours (overnight is best!)
2. Remove strawberries and bananas from freezer and place in food processor, blend until they are the consistency of soft serve ice cream.
3. Add almond milk (more or less for desired texture) and vanilla and blend until smooth and well-mixed.
4. Transfer ice cream to a freezer container and freeze until solid. (You don't have to wait if fruit is frozen, it is like soft serve ice cream).
5. Scoop with ice cream scoop and serve.

You can really use any frozen fruit to make this.

Garlic Chicken Pasta *Total Time: Prep/Total Time: 30 min. Yield: 8 servings*

Ingredients:

- 1 package (1 pound) pasta
- 1 pound boneless skinless chicken
- 1 cup olive oil, *divided*
- 2-3/4 cups sliced fresh mushrooms
- 5 garlic cloves, minced
- 1/2 cup white wine or chicken broth
- 1/2 cup roma tomatoes, chopped
- 1/4 cup minced fresh parsley
- 1/2 teaspoon dried basil
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 1/4 teaspoon pepper
- 1/8 teaspoon crushed red pepper flakes
- 1 cup grated Parmesan cheese

Directions:

1. Cook pasta according to package directions.
2. In a large skillet, sauté chicken in 1/4 olive oil until no longer pink. (I used chicken smoked on the grill). Remove and keep warm. Add mushrooms and garlic to the pan; sauté until tender. Stir in the wine or broth, tomatoes, parsley, basil, salt, pepper, pepper flakes and chicken; heat though.
3. Drain pasta. Add the chicken mixture, cheese and remaining oil; toss to coat.

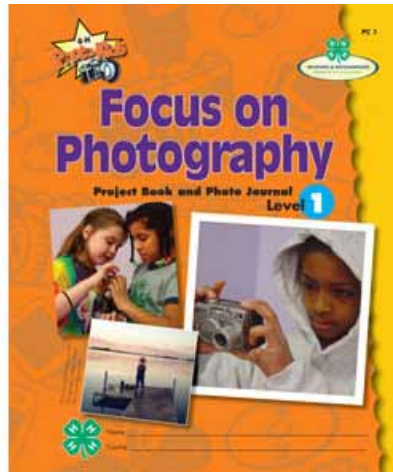

Re-enrollment will be easier this year since all you need to do is update the information you submitted last year.

Selecting Projects:

Refer to the Project Guide to choose your projects. Grade levels are suggested for most (but not all) units. A 4-H member should limit the number of projects to what he or she can reasonably accomplish in a year. *It's better to do a really good job on one or two projects than a halfway job on a bunch of projects.*

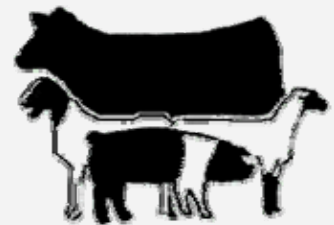
