

### **ADVICE FROM A SPA NUTRITIONIST**

In June of 2016, my girlfriend and I flew to Pennsylvania for a five night spa vacation at Deerfield Spa (<a href="www.deerfieldspa.com">www.deerfieldspa.com</a>) in East Stroudsburg. During our stay, the spa's nutritionist made presentations to our group and also provided a cooking demonstration. This is when I first learned about the "Dirty Dozen" and the "Clean 15".

Each year the Environmental Working Group (www.ewg.org) analyzes USDA testing on conventionally grown produce to determine pesticide levels. The Dirty Dozen are the fresh produce that tests show have the highest level of pesticide residues. The produce on the Clean 15 list had pesticide levels that tested much lower.

The Deerfield Spa nutritionist, stated her preference for choosing organic produce stating,

"If you can do just one thing for yourself and your health, buy organic produce for those items on the Dirty Dozen list."



I know organic produce is available locally in at the Chequamegon Food Coop as well as at other local grocery stores. Organic produce sometimes costs more than non-organic, and it is not always an economical option for everyone. People can use the lists from the EWG to make informed choices. I have been making an effort to buy organic whenever possible. I believe I am worth it.

Another recommendation made buy the spa nutritionist was to wash your fresh produce. She used a Fruit & Vegetable Wash that comes in a spray bottle. I found mine at the Chequamegon Food Coop and have been using it for over a year now. The Nutritionist also demonstrated using a soft bristle brush to scrub the outside peel/skin of most of the fruit and vegetables she was using during the cooking demonstration.

We all want to eat healthy and most of us enjoy eating fresh fruits and vegetables, but no one wants to eat pesticides! I hope you will now be more aware of produce testing results and how you can make an informed choice.

### "Here Comes Excitement!"

Annual State Conference, September 11-13, Glacier Canyon Lodge, Wisconsin Dells -By Glory Bizub

The HCE conferences always have special tours of interest for the area, and I went to see the International Crane Foundation and the Aldo Leopold Homestead.

The crane reserve is the only place On Earth where all 15 of the world's cranes can be seen. They are being protected and other reserves have breeding programs. The cranes are in danger of becoming extinct because of habitat loss, predators, and the black market, where the eggs are taken and sold for profit. Crane size ranges from four to six feet tall. The feathers are extremely beautiful and very long, another reason why they are hunted. I was very impressed with the Foundation's efforts to teach people around the world and how to manage their crane population and habitat. Pictures of the cranes are on the Foundation's web sites. Our group also went to the Aldo Leopold place called the "Shack". This was a family learning place. They worked on restoring the landscape back to its earlier forests and prairies. This was the beginning of conservation in the lower part of Wisconsin. It only takes one dedicated person and family to see what could become of the area if it's not taken care of and managed. The tours were an excellent opportunity to learn about Wisconsin, and the resources it offers.



I also attended some workshops. Fermentation Fest, with headquarters in Reedsburg, was an entertaining celebration of fermentation. If you think about it, many of our foods are fermented or canned to make the foods last through the seasons, using the natural processes of decay learned from cultural traditions. This small community decided to have a festival and a "DeTour" of the tiny towns around Reedsburg. On the tour, each town had displays of art in the fields, food stands, tasting and hands-on events. I

can't describe it all, but I wanted to join this area to be involved in the hard work and community spirit they had to make their towns come alive and survive. Check it out at <u>Fermentationfest.com</u>.

I went to "Growing your Garlic", an informative class on all the benefits we can get from garlic. One of the many things I learned was that the Elephant garlic I plant; is not a true garlic; it is a scallion. It's still good and has a milder taste, but it does not have the shelf life that the German Hardy garlic has.

Also, they didn't recommend planting the garlic that is in the grocery stores. These come from who knows where and are bleached for preserving. Buy the garlic bulbs from the local farmers market. These are grown in the area and are easy to plant in the fall. Planting six garlic cloves in the fall, will yield six large garlic bulbs in late summer, a very good return on a small investment.

Still have some green tomatoes? Here's a tasty Green Tomato Salsa Recipe from UW-Extension's Learning Store.

You can use either tomatillos or green tomatoes.

#### **TOMATILLO GREEN SALSA**

5 cups tomatillos or green tomatoes, chopped

1 1/2 cups long green chilies, peeled, seeded, and chopped, (3 chilies)

1/2 cup jalapeno peppers, seeded and finely chopped (2 peppers)

4 cups onions, chopped (2 medium)

1 cup bottled lemon juice

6 cloves garlic (minced)

1TBSP ground cumin (optional)

2TBSP dried cilantro (optional)

1 TBSP salt

1tsp red pepper

Yield: About 5 pints

For safe canned salsa

- Carefully measure and all ingredients
- Do not make substitutions or adjustments unless the recipe calls for it.
   Do not substitute vinegar for lemon juice.
- Measure chopped vegetables not whole ones. (Amounts in parentheses in this recipe are guidelines but measuring is a must).



Jalapeno peppers do not need to be

peeled. Peel and prepare chili peppers, if desired. Chop tomatillos or green tomatoes.

Combine all ingredients in a large saucepan and heat; stirring occasionally. Ladle hot salsa into clean, hot pint jars, leaving 1/2 inch headspace. Remove air bubbles and adjust headspace if needed. Wipe jar rims and cap with lids treated according to manufacturer directions.

#### **Variations**

The mix of hot and mild peppers can be varied as long as the total amount of peppers stays the same.

Process in a boiling water canner. Use the elevation in your area for processing time. If in doubt, process for the longer time. Process time in a boiling water canner for hot pack pint jars at the following elevations:

0—1,000 feet- - - -15 minutes

1,001—6,000 feet- - - -20 minutes



**CAUTION!!** The volatile oils in hot peppers can cause burns.

- Wear disposable gloves when you cut or chop these peppers.
- Do NOT touch your face, particularly near your eyes.
- Wash hands thoroughly with soap and water after cutting or chopping peppers or after removing gloves.


