Dear 4-H Families:

Congratulations and thanks to the 20 high school counselors who did a great job of leading their campers at this year's "Survivor" themed summer camp. For three days 56 campers in grades 3-8 participated in a wide range of educational activities, recreation, and fun at Pigeon Lake Camp in Drummond, led by the counselors and adult staff and volunteers.

To establish shared expectations, camp counselors are trained to introduce and uphold the ARCH, a model which is used both at camp and on Bayfield County 4-H expectation forms to create shared expectations for behavior and working together successfully as a group.



The ARCH stands for the values **Accountability**, **Compassion**, **Respect**, and **Honesty**. The fifth piece, or "keystone" to the ARCH is everyone's **commit-ment** to applying all of these values at the same time.

Your Leaders Association is in a time of transition and will be meeting with representatives from each club on August 4th to take a look at where the 4H program is going, what can be done to keep it strong, and what new directions should be explored. A few very dedicated and hard working individuals carry a lot of the responsibility for the 4H program in Bayfield County, and this is a time

for all adults who care about seeing the 4H program continue strong ask themselves what they can do to help. Shared responsibility yields shared benefit for the kids and adults of our 4-H community.

Older Member Awards Workshop for Teens

and Scholarships: Applications available mid-August and due September 19

Bayfield County 4-H annually recognizes its older members' achievements and leadership potential through the Older Member Awards process. 4-H'ers who will be entering the 8th grade this fall (and members up to 12th grade) are eligible to apply.

This is the process through which teen members are chosen to be Ambassadors and receive scholarships for trips such as Citizenship Washington Focus, State 4-H Conference, and Winter Camp.

The Key Award will also be selected in September, so this fall's juniors and seniors should keep that in mind when completing their record books this year. Citizenship Washington Focus: A Trip of A Lifetime By: Rebecca Janisch

Citizenship Washington Focus, CWF, is an outstanding experience for older 4-H members in which I partook on July $9^{th} - 17^{th} 2011$. CWF is a trip to Washington D.C in which you are able to deeply explore our nation's capitol and also gain better knowledge of how the government functions and also our duties as citizens.

My journey actually began last fall by filling out numerous papers and also participating in a teleconference. Finally the day rolled around and I embarked on a 23 hour bus ride from Eau Clair to Gettysburg with 50 other delegates from Wisconsin.

Our first day was spent touring Gettysburg and learning about the Civil War. Later that day we finally arrived in D.C and we went to the National Zoo. After that we checked into the National 4-H center which is located in Chevy Chase, Maryland and broke into different committees and groups. I was on the talent committee which planned and hosted a talent show. Later that night we were able to meet with delegates from other states as well. The other states participating that week were Louisiana, Georgia, Florida, California, South Dakota, New Jersey, and Wisconsin.

In the days to follow we participated in numerous workshops and committee meetings and also saw Mount Vernon (George Washington's home), Iwo Jima, WWII, Vietnam, Lincoln, Korean, Thomas Jefferson & FDR memorials, Arlington National Cemetery, Capitol Hill where we also were able to meet with our state senators, the National Cathedral, The Kennedy Center, and many of the Smithsonian museums. Later in the week we put on a mock congressional session in which we were able to debate and vote on different issues just like it would be done in congress. I thought it was awesome and very well put together.



One other highlight of the week was a play that we went to in the Kennedy Center titled "Shear Madness."

Overall this was a great experience and I am so glad I was able to go! This trip really would not have been a possibility without support from the 4-H Leader's Association. I also strongly encourage other older members to take advantage of this great program.

Wisconsin Covenant

Sign the Wisconsin **Covenant Pledge!**

2011/12 Freshmen have until September 30. 2011 to enroll in the Wisconsin Covenant! Unfortunately, 2011/12 eighth graders are no longer eligible to sign the Pledge.

Wisconsin students are invited to sign the Wisconsin Covenant Pledge, no later than September 30, 2011, to work hard and fulfill certain requirements:

- Graduate from a Wisconsin • High School
- Maintain at least a B average • while in high school
- Take classes that will prepare them for high school and make them eligible for admission to a Wisconsin institution of higher education.

- Demonstrate good citizenship by completing community service or service learning hours and abiding by the law
- Apply for federal financial aid • by April 1 of their senior year of high school
- Apply to a Wisconsin institution of higher education

If they fulfill these requirements and submit the necessary paperwork to the State Covenant office by April 1 of their senior year of high school, they will be confirmed as Wisconsin Covenant Scholars who are guaranteed admission to a line, 8th graders are encouraged to Wisconsin institution of higher education and entitled to a Covenant Grant worth \$250-\$1000, based on Covenant website at http:// family's average income. If a student's family's average income is \$25,000 or less students are also

entitled to a Covenant Foundation Grant of \$1500. The grants are available to students for up to four years (8 semesters).

The goal of this program is not only to encourage students for their hard work, positive citizenship, and follow through but to help make certain they earn their college degrees by removing the lack of money as a barrier to their education.

The deadline to sign the Wisconsin Covenant pledge is September 30, 2011. Between now and the deadsign the pledge to benefit from the program. Visit the Wisconsin www.wisconsincovenant.wi.gov/ for more information, including pledge form.

Statewide Training for 4-H Photo Leaders, Judges Slated Sept. 23-25



Please mark your calendars for *"Foto Follies 2011,"* a statewide training program for Wisconsin 4-H youth and adult photo leaders and county fair judges, to be held Sept. 23-25, at Upham Woods Environmental Education Center, Wisconsin Dells.

The conference begins with registration at 6 p.m. on Friday and ends at 11:30 a.m. on Sunday. It will feature separate tracks for beginning and advanced photo leaders, as well as sessions for those who want to be registered as county fair photography judges. The conference costs \$80 per person if you stay in the lodge, and \$72 if you stay in a cabin. This fee will cover five workshop sessions; keynote talk; personal photo critiques; photo walks and activities; two breakfasts, lunch and dinner; two nights lodging in a dorm or cabin; and all program materials. All youth leaders must be in high school and accompanied by an adult.

For adult and youth 4-H photo volunteers, the conference will focus on ideas and information on how to be an effective leader, with an emphasis on resources and activities that you can use to teach photography to young people. You'll also have many opportunities to practice and improve your own photo-taking skills.

Workshop choices will include photo composition and technique; basic portraiture and lighting; studio lighting and portraiture; taking photos of people and animals; taking still life photos, taking photos of buildings; outdoor photography; and sessions related to digital photography, manipulation and presentation. For new and aspiring judges, sessions will cover the basics of Danish and conference judging photos at Wisconsin county fairs. You can use this opportunity to polish your judging skills or to become registered as a Dept. 20 county fair judge.

Using the Barns?

Just a few reminders for those using the barns:

- Have your health forms ready
- <u>Wait to unload your animal(s)</u> until you have checked with the Superintendent and have shown him/her any health forms.
- All stalls and pens are assigned by the Super.
- Park your truck and trailer in the parking lot after you have dropped off your feed and animals.
- Straw, hay & wood shavings can be used for bedding. Do not use shredded paper for bedding.
- Wood shavings will be for sale during the Fair. Stop at the Fair office.
- Keep the barns clean. This means thoroughly cleaning your stalls daily after the barns close Not just covering things up with fresh bedding and hauling everything out on Sunday.
- Do not eat or drink in the barns. Set a good example for the Public.
- When the Public leaves the barns, Thank them for stopping by & Remind them that there are hand washing stations and Purell dispensers near the barn exits, if they wish to wash their hands.

Getting to the Barns!

Again this year, there will be limited vehicle traffic allowed to the barns and camping areas. The times and gates to use are as follows:

- Thursday 11am 8pm Gate 3 open (between Dairy & Draft Horse barns)
- Friday- Sunday 7am-9am Driveway access back and forth in front of office (you must park your vehicle in the main parking lot by 9am
- ◆ Sunday 5pm-8pm Gate 3 open

Please follow these additional rules and guidelines:

• The person(s) in the vehicle

must have a Daily or a Season wristband. .

- After you have unloaded/loaded and fed your animals; you must park in the regular parking lot. Please do not stay parked near the barns.
- Be courteous to our gate people, they are just doing their jobs.
- SLOW DOWN! If you feel like you could walk faster than what you are driving; that is the right speed!!!
- Expect the unexpected! Adults and kids don't always pay attention to what's going on around them—use caution..
- If the handicapped parking area is full (usually Sunday), the Fair



Committee will designate additional handicapped parking for the public near the sheep & swine barns.

We hope you understand that we are striving to keep everyone at the Bayfield County Fair safe & accident free.

Free Pullorum Testing Clinic

Monday, Aug 8th & Wednesday, Aug 10th • 4 pm to 7 pm Bayfield County Fairgrounds, 7080 N Main St, Iron River

David Lindelof and Margie Falter will be holding a free pullorum testing clinic for poultry & waterfowl that will be shown in Open & Junior Class at the 2011 Bayfield • County Fair. Please bring with you (or know) your Premise ID number to the pullorum testing clinic. **Turkeys will NOT be tested at this clinic**.

To bring your poultry or waterfowl to the Fair, you must have a **Premise ID number AND** your birds must be from a **pullorum free flock or tested as pullorum free. Your birds that are going to the Fair must be individually tested if:**

 You do not have an official certificate stating your birds are from or enrolled in a National Poultry Improvement Plan (NPIP) or in the WI Certified Tested Flock (WTF) or a WI Assoc Flock. (WAF)

OR

Your birds <u>have been **on site** where older chick-</u> <u>ens</u> (wintered over from last year) are located, regardless of certification or age.

Camping

- <u>ALL camping sites are assigned including</u> <u>primitive sites.</u>
- Check in at the Fair Office on the Fairgrounds <u>BEFORE you set up your camp</u> <u>site.</u> (Your campsite may be different then in the past)
- Place your camping permit in a visible spot.
- People camping with their horses should be set up in the designated "Horse Camping " areas only. Near the Horse Trailer parking -SE of the Diamon (Green) Horse Barn.
- Remember to use "common sense" and "common courtesy" when setting up your campsite.
- No generators are allowed in the primitive camping areas .
- Anyone under the age of 18 must be camping with a responsible adult.
