Arts & Crafts and Photography members:


- One entry per numbered category, please

Types of Grant Applications

4-H Club or Project Support

To offset the cost of educational experiences related to 4-H club and/or projects. Ideas that help promote and retain active interest of 4-H members.

Leadership Development and Community Service

Submitted by youth member with an idea to organize an event or experience that demonstrates active leadership and positive community development.

Requirements

Grant applications must be supported and signed by both a certified 4-H leader and 4-H member involved in the club or project activity. 2) Potential of request to have a 4-H Clubs must have been in existence at least 6 months before submitting an application.

Mini grant applications will be considered as they are received and should be submitted to the Bayfield County 4-H office by the application one week prior to a scheduled 4-H Leaders Association meeting. Grant applications will be reviewed and a decided upon at the 4-H Leaders meeting following the deadline. The next three 4-H Leaders meetings are March 18th. April 15th and May 20th

The 2014 Bay Area Farm and Garden Show and the BIG Dairy Breakfast will take place on March 29 at the Bay Area Civic Center in Ashland.

The Show, which is open from 8am till 1pm, will feature a wide variety of commercial exhibitors with products for sale or educational material to distribute. The Ashland FFA members will set up a petting zoo for the youngsters again. There are lots of things to see and do.

The Breakfast will again feature the "all Wisconsin Scrambled Omelet" which will be made in the big 54-inch frying pan in the exhibit area. Each omelet consists of ½ pound of butter, 6 pounds of cheddar cheese, 6 pounds of ham, 250 eggs, onions, mushrooms and salt and pepper. The cost of the meal, which consists of the omelet, sliced cheese, muffins, milk, juice and ice cream with strawberry or chocolate topping, is \$7 for adults and \$3 for children age

6 to 10. Breakfast is served from 8am till 12:30pm.

The Breakfast is served by the Ashland and Bayfield County 4-H members. There are three work shifts: from 7am to 9am, 8:30am to 11am and 10:30am to 12:30pm. To help distribute volunteer assignments, 4-H members and leaders are asked to choose the shift they want to work at and let their General Leader know. General Leaders are asked to gather this information and get it to Verne Gilles at 682-4408 or the Extension Office so we are assured of having coverage on all shifts. Work consists of such activities as making sundaes, serving omelets, organizing milk and juice, serving coffee, selling tickets and clearing tables.

4-H CANSKI Wisconsin High School Nordic Ski Champions

The 4-H Chequamegon Area Nordic Ski Team (4-H CAN-SKI) made up of skiers from Ashland and Washburn High Schools won the Wisconsin High School Nordic Ski Championships decisively by beating perennial state powerhouses Lakeland, Madison, and Ashwaubenon to take the state title.

Cold temperatures at the Telemark trails didn't do much to cool the skiers on Saturday as the boys finished seven points in the lead after the skate race. Senior **Ian Liphart** led the team with a third-place overall in 13:06, behind winner Dan Delestry of Chippewa Valley Nordic (12:54), and Lakeland's Mack Fitzpatrick (13:00) on the technically difficult 5K course.

Kevin Geisen and **Colin Liphart** sealed the deal for 4-H CANSKI with eighth and 13th place finishes to put the team in first place. **Matt Kubik** and **Jordan Pearce** rounded out the top 5 positions for the CANSKI team.

"Predictions for the race didn't even put our boys in the top three, despite the fact that we won the Northern Conference championships," said Coach Doug Liphart. "That left our boys pretty fired up and a couple of teams on the hunt for us coming into Sunday's classic race."

Sunday morning brought a sub-zero start and an inspired performance from the CANSKI squad, who are strong in the classic technique. **Ian Liphart** and Mack Fitzpatrick hunted down Dan Delestry in the rolling hills and hairpin turns on the first half of the course. Delestry responded with a surge late in the course on a steep 300-meter hill, and succumbed to a blistering sprint by Fitzpatrick at the finish. Fitzpatrick won with a 13:44, Delestry was second in 13:48, and Liphart third in the state with a 13:57.

According to coach Doug Liphart, "lan had a great race and did his job today," Coach Liphart said. "I was getting nervous about our second and third skiers because it was a dogfight out there, but **Kevin Geisen** picked up a place and **Colin Liphart** picked two skiers off in what I can only describe as incredibly inspired performances. Fourth and fifth skiers **Matt Kubik** and **Jordan Pearce** did a great job as displacers for us."

The boys widened their lead over Lakeland to win by 15 points, one of the wider margins in recent years. 4-H CAN-SKI finished with 21 points, Lakeland with 36 and Madison with 46 in a field of 20 teams. Also skiing for the CANSKI boys were Cody Larson, Reed Edmunds and Nick Smith.

Morgan Hinson led the 4-H CANSKI girls on Saturday in the 5K skate race with a 20:22, good for 42nd place, and placed 41st in the classic race. Teammate **Ketzel Levens** skied second for the CANSKI team on Saturday (44th, 20:26) and was the team's top scorer in the classic picking up an impressive 24 places to finish 20th (19:43). **Anna Nutt** was 53rd in the skate race and 66th in the classic. German exchange student **Anna Haag** rounded out the

4-H CANSKI girls' squad with a 75th on Saturday, and 48th on Sunday, finishing her first season of cross country ski racing.

"The girls demonstrated the technique that we've been working hard on all season," said Coach Beth Reed. "They skied efficiently and tactically smart races. This young squad did a great job this weekend." The 4-H CANSKI girls finished 10th in a field of 20 teams. Iola won the state championships with 20 points, Lakeland was second with 22, and Peak Nordic out of Waukesha had 24 points for third.

Middle school Nordic championships were held at the same venue.

4-H CANSKI's **Derek Kozak** was fourth in the skate and second in classic. Teammates **Dalton Collins** and **Eric VanHorn** both cracked the top 10. **Anna Edmunds** finished 10th overall on the girls' side in middle school and **Pooja Geisen** was 35th.

"To have three boys in the top 10 is awesome," said Coach Matt Edmunds. "Their addition and that of Anna Edmunds to the high school team next year bodes well for the future of skiing in our area. I've got more young skiers coming up the pipeline to step into their places at the middle school level as well."

Rounding out the Middle School boys team with excellent performances on the 3K course were **Ryan Meeker** and **Bradley Kubik**.

The weekend was a successful and historic one for the 10 year old 4HCANSKI program as the skiers demonstrated their talent and dedication with a state title and their promise for the future in young area skiers.

- 4. Vocal and instrumental entries are to provide a copy of their music for the judge.
