4-H Summer Camp Coming July 11-13! New Location - Camp Northwoods, Delta

If you are a 4-H member in grades 3-8, you are invited to be part of this year's 4-H Camp, July 11-13 at Camp Northwoods in Delta. Camp Northwoods is a Girl Scout Camp and a new location for us this year. The camp is in a beautiful wooded area, has nice facilities, a great lake for swimming and boating, a group campfire area and all of the regular amenities. This year's theme will be "Survivor." The counselors are already working on fun ideas for activities to go with the theme. As always, the camp program will include swimming, arts and crafts, canoeing, campfires and singing, nature education, skits, and large and small group games.

Campers will arrive between 9-10 a.m. on Friday morning, July 11. Two nights will be spent with kids of the same age group and gender in a troop house that houses up to 22 or a yurt that houses 12. Check

out will be the afternoon of Sunday the 13th.

Campers will be supervised by trained counselors, 4-H Youth Development staff from Ashland and Bayfield Counties, and 4-H certified adult volunteers.

You will find the camper registration form on the next page of this newsletter. The cost for each camper is \$75. Check with your club to see if they provide scholarships. Further scholarship opportunities are available for families with more than one child attending camp or with financial need. If your child or someone you know needs this assistance to be able to attend, please don't hesitate to request it on your registration form or call the 4-H office. Requests will be kept confidential.

Registrations are due June 16 with a \$20 deposit. Registrations received after that time can not be

guaranteed a spot, so get them in on time!

Note: Camp finances are now run through the Bayfield County UWEX office. Please make your checks out to **Bayfield County UWEX**.

In 2006 a 24' x 32' open sided shelter was built with the potential of someday framing the building out and adding a woods stove to make the property more suited for spring and fall programming.





The Workshop in Oulu

They're back! The Foods Revue will be held in the morning, with The Clothing Revue in the afternoon. Both are judged Fair events with premiums. Registration for the events is separate.

Foods Revue

All members in the Foods and Nutrition project are invited to participate in this fun and educational event. The theme this year is "Healthy Living." Here's what to do:

- Select a main dish food that fits with the theme of healthy living. This should be a food that is relatively low in sugar and fat and has good nutrition for the body.
- 2. Practice preparing your food using your selected recipe.
- 3. Plan a menu in which the food will be used.
- Plan the table service needed to attractively serve the food. Include dishes, silverware or other utensils, table linen or placemat, and a centerpiece.
- 5. The day of the revue you will prepare the food at home, then take the food to where the re-

vue will be held, along with the table service and two display cards: one with the recipe and one with the menu.

- Set up your display at the Foods Revue. Table space will be provided for each exhibitor.
- 7. Be prepared to talk with the judge and answer questions about the nutritional value of the food and why you selected it. Also be prepared to talk with the judge about how you prepared the food in a sanitary and healthy way, the menu you selected, and your choice of table service.

We have "Healthy & Homemade Meals" 2014 calendars with recipes, menu ideas, and nutrition information that would be a great resource for you to prepare for the Foods Revue. Contact Donna if you'd like to have one of these calendars.



Clothing Revue

Coggins Update— 5/9/14

A message from the Division of Animal Health:

Equine Infectious Anemia (EIA) testing requirements change in Wisconsin

Equine Infectious Anemia test results done within the 12 months prior to the date of import are now acceptable when importing horses into Wisconsin. Nursing foals accompanying an EIA-negative dam are exempt from pre-import testing as long as the nursing status is identified on the Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI). The EIA test date and result must be written on the CVI. **This change also applies** to horses changing ownership in Wisconsin and **horses attending fairs and exhibitions.** Prior to this, all horses participating in fairs or exhibitions would have to have a negative EIA test during the calendar year of the exhibition. Anyone with questions can call the WI DATCP 800-572-8981 for assistance.

A few items that Horse Members should take note of:

- Please check with the Superintendent <u>before you unload</u> your horse.
- 2. **MANDATORY** meeting is on Thursday evening—7 pm.
- Open Class will be judged on Thursday at 7:30 pm, Junior Halter & Showmanship will be judged immediately following Open Class judging.
- 4. Horse Judging on Friday begins at 10:30 am.



 Gymkhana games are once again on Friday. These will be judged in the Regular Judging style—NOT Danish style judging - premiums will be paid.

 The premiums will be paid out in accordance with the WI State Statutes. This means we will not limit the classes you enter, but rather which classes you will be eligible for premiums in. Only 2 premiums will be paid out per exhibitor, regardless of the number of classes/lots you have entered.

Using the Barns? Just a few reminders ...

- Have your health forms ready
- Wait to unload your animal(s) until after you have checked with the Superintendent and have shown him/her any health forms.
- All stalls and pens are assigned by the Super.
- Park your truck and trailer in the parking lot after you have dropped off your feed and animals.
- Straw, hay & wood shavings can be used for bedding. Do not use shredded paper for bedding.
- Wood shavings will be for sale during the Fair at the Fair office.
- Keep the barns clean. This means thoroughly cleaning your stalls daily after the barns close - Not just covering things up with fresh bedding and hauling everything out on Sunday.
- Do not eat or drink in the barns. (For health safety reasons.) Set a good example for the Public.



 Keep your hands clean-wash them often.

When the Public leaves the barns, thank them for stopping by and remind them that there are hand washing stations and Purell dispensers near the barn exits, for them to wash their hands.

Getting to the barns ...

Again this year, there will be limited vehicle traffic allowed to the barns and camping areas. The times and gates to use are as follows:

- ◆ Thursday 11am 8pm Gate 3 open (between Dairy & Draft Horse barns)
- Friday- Sunday 7am-9am –
 Driveway access back and forth
 in front of office (you must park
 your vehicle in the main parking
 lot by 9am
- Sunday 5pm-8pm Gate 3 open

Please follow these additional rules and guidelines:

- ALL person(s) in the vehicle must have a Daily or a Season wristband.
- After you have unloaded/loaded and fed your animals; you must park in the regular parking lot. Please do not stay parked near the barns.
- Be courteous to our gate people; they are just doing their jobs.
- SLOW DOWN! If you feel like you could walk faster than what you are driving; that is the right speed!!!
- Expect the unexpected! Adults and kids don't always pay attention to what's going on around them—use caution.
- If the handicapped parking area is full (usually Sunday), the Fair Committee will designate additional handicapped parking for the public near the sheep & swine barns.

We hope you understand that we are striving to keep everyone at the Bayfield County Fair safe & accident free.
