
Lesson Day Cancer Clear & Simple

Lesson Day was given by Liz Lexau on March 9 at Delta Town Hall on the topic of cancer. We learned of cancer risks and things we can do to help prevent it. Diet, lack of exercise, being overweight, family history and tobacco are among the risks. We can change some of these to help lower risk. We

also learned that Bayfield County has a higher than average rate of cancer. This lesson was from *Cancer Clear & Simple, a* program that is part of a partnership between UW Carbone Cancer Center's Cancer Health Disparities Initiative (CHDI) and UW-Extension. 

Answers: Cancer Risk Factors While we can't control all cancer risk (like the 2% of risk that comes from family history), there are many choices we can make to substantially lower risk of developing cancer. Faith is planning a Bookworms™ booth at the fair. Each club is taking four books and




creating a scene from them for the exhibit. A project from each club will be shown, letting people know what we are doing to give books to children for their own home library.


