



Aldo Leopold Writing Contest 2018

Aldo Leopold is best known for writing A Sand County Almanac (1949), in which he articulates his vision of a "land ethic" - that people come to "see land as a community to which we belong" and learn to "live on a piece of land without spoiling it."

As a work of great literature, A Sand County Almanac powerfully reshapes our understanding of the relationship between people and land. The Wisconsin Aldo Leopold Writing Contest uses Leopold's ideas to inspire students to 2018 Writing Contest Topic participate in the evolution of the land ethic through the written word.

The Contest

Each year students in grades 9 through 12, in public, private, and home schools in Wisconsin are invited to consider a writing prompt or question and create an essay response in 500 words.

Three winning essays are chosen from each category (9th -10th grade and 11th-12th grade). The top three 9th-10th grade essayists and the top three 11th-12th grade essayists will each be awarded \$200.

Winning essays are featured on the Aldo Leopold Foundation website and may be printed in The Leopold Outlook magazine. Winners will also receive a copy of A Sand

County Almanac, and memberships to the Aldo Leopold Foundation. International Crane Foundation, and the Aldo Leopold Nature Center. An awards ceremony will take place at the Leopold Center in Baraboo, WI on Saturday, May 19.

Students are encouraged to read and reference the "Forward" and other essays from Leopold's A Sand County Almanac in their responses.

The next meeting will be held at the Iron River community center on Sunday, January 14th, at 6 o'clock.



Requirements

Grant applications must be supported and signed by both a certified 4-H leader and 4-H member involved in the club or project activity. 4-H Clubs must have been in existence at least 6 months before submitting an application.

Mini grant applications will be considered as they are received and should be submitted to the Bayfield County 4-H office by the application one week prior to a scheduled 4-H Leaders Association meeting. Grant applications will be reviewed and a decided upon at the 4-H Leaders meeting following the deadline. The next three 4-H Leaders meetings are March 21st April 18th and May 16th

Criteria for Awarding Funds

- 1) Application completed and submitted by the deadline.
- 2) Potential of request to have a positive impact on 4-H members.
- 3) Potential of retaining 4-H members interested in the program or a 4-H project.
- 4) How well the application identifies the need for financial support from the club, community or 4-H program project.

Fair Affairs

The Fair is over and we're well into planning for the new one that's on the way. We thank you all for participating. We also would like to remind everyone who hasn't cashed their premium checks to please do so as soon as possible. We know some of the checks are small, but it is very important everyone cash their checks.

Here's why...

At the end of the Fair, long after the exhibitors have picked up their exhibits and their ribbons, long after the rides have been disassembled and everyone is thinking about the holidays, the work continues for us. Reports are compiled, and information is sent to the State. Much of this information is gathered for statistical purposes. However, one of the numbers reported determines the amount of aid we receive from the State and that is a large portion of the Premiums that get paid out to the exhibitors. If you don't cash your checks, we must reimburse the State for monies we received that were "not paid out" so please help us in our efforts to take good care of taxpayer dollars by cashing your checks.

Bayfield and Ashland County Students Participate in 33rd Annual Superior Days in Madison

Madison-

For three days in late February seven Bayfield County Youth Delegates, had the opportunity to participate in the 33rd annual Superior Days. Superior Days is a three-day lobbying event that allows local representatives, community leaders, and students a chance to bring Legislative Issues specific to Northwestern Wisconsin down to the State Capitol in Madison. Lobbying teams meet with state legislatures from across Wisconsin, educating them on the unique issues of our area and the solutions that we would like to see. This year, the major issues brought to the Capitol were an Increase in Payment in Lieu of Taxes for county forests, increase in Medicaid reimbursement for Elderly Care Facilities, the Better City Superior Exposition proposal, and increasing county control for water regulations. In addition, our Bayfield County group had an opportunity to present our perspective to the Public Service Commission on the new transmission line being proposed between Ashland and Bayfield. Since one of the proposed transmission line upgrades run through Washburn's soccer fields, we felt very strongly that both Xcel Energy and the PSC could explore alternative forms of energy such as renewable and distributive in place of this line.

On the way down to Madison we braved a winter storm with the help of our brave chaperone Ian Meeker.
Once there, we toured the University of Wisconsin Research Park and learned about several new innovative companies in the biotech field.

Journalism at UW Madison, gave a presentation on media bias and fake news. The effects this kind of sensationalism is having on our country in huge but Mr. Wagner explained some of the best ways to combat it.

Afterwards, we met with State Senator Janet Bewley who gave us a tour of the Capitol and told us about the upcoming senate and assembly sessions that would take place the next day. The next day our lobby teams walked about the state capitol from one meeting to the next to present our issues. Collectively we were able to meet with all of Wisconsin's Legislators. It was interesting to talk with the representatives or their staff and hear their opinions on the topics we addressed. Since the Senate and Assembly were in session, a few of us were able to listen in on the floor debates and the legislation being passed. Later that day, during the youth banquet, our keynote speaker, Michael Wagner, Associate Professor in the School of Journalism at UW Madison, gave a presentation on media bias and fake news. The effects this kind of sensationalism is having on our country is huge but Mr. Wagner explained

Finally, on the last day, we presented to the Public Service Commission to address the new transmission line and encouraged them to consider increasing renewable and distributive energy in our area and Wisconsin as a whole. It was a really great opportunity to be able address the agency and they appeared very receptive to our ideas. Lastly, Representatives Beth Meyers and Nick Milroy, and Senator Bewley spoke to the Superior Days group on the state of our area. They were enthusiastic about the proposals we had lobbied for and pledged their support in working to make them happen. Overall, Superior Days was very successful and as students, we felt that the things that mattered to us were really being listened to.

Music

- 1. 30 minute time limit
- 2. Any live or taped accompaniment is to be provided by the performer. Tape or CD players must be furnished by participants.
- 3. Performers must be youth. (Accompanist may be an adult or non-4H member, but the performing group must be made up of youth.)
- 4. Vocal and instrumental entries are to provide a copy of their music for the judge.

Drama
