4. **Insight From Mars**– Learn how to use Scratch, a block-based coding language developed by MIT and code an animated story.



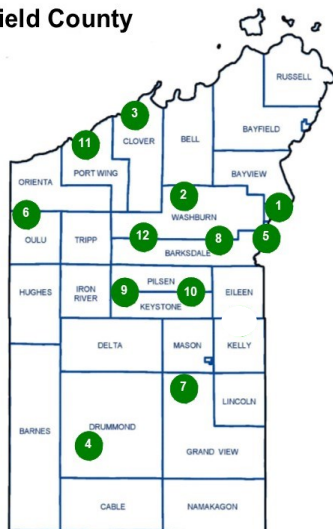

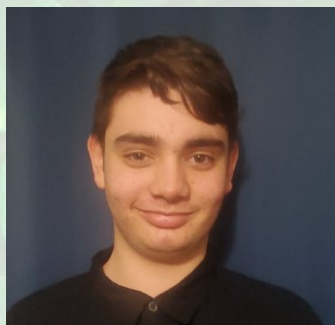


Hello, my name is Seth Johnson. I am a member of the Friendly Valley club and a senior at Washburn High School. I have been in 4-H for 10 years.

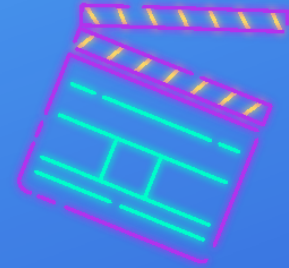
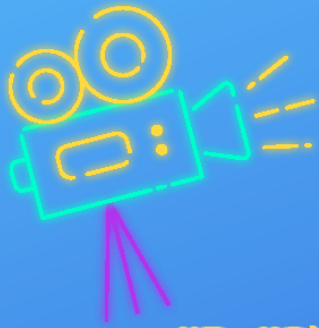

Why give demonstrations? A demonstration helps others learn how to do something useful, perhaps in an easier or more practical way. Demonstrating is one of the best methods of teaching others, because it involves visual and verbal presentations at the same time.

Remember to have fun! Making a video demonstration opens up a lot of opportunities! You could take us out to your barn, get your family members involved, show us how to do something outdoors, the options are endless! Older members are welcome to edit their videos and add effects if that is something they are interested in.

Get creative!



- A video demonstration has three parts:
1. Introduction — what the member is demonstrating
 2. Body — the steps of the skill and how to do them.
 3. Summary — review of the steps.



Members should consider the following as they select a demonstration topic.

- Can I demonstrate the topic in the allotted time?
- Does the topic have enough action?
- Is the topic appropriate for my age and experience?

Open to all youth in grades K-12 who are enrolled in 4-H.
Individuals may submit one demonstration video each.
Videos will be judged, and prizes will be awarded in each category.

Categories:

- Grades K-2 (Cloverbud): 1-3 minute video
- Grades 3-5: 3-5 minute video
- Grades 6-8: 6-12 minute video
- Grades 9-13: 6-12 minute video

- Recipients will be announced by August 27, 2021. Proof of enrollment in a Wisconsin public or private college is required to receive a scholarship.



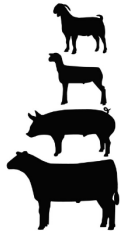

Encourage and support all youth, especially your own, to have empathy and concern for others. Show your child, by example, how to cooperate and communicate with those around them.

Winter Wildlife WHEP & Forestry 4-H Art Contest 2021 Registration Form



Registration is required by mailing this form & payment by February 15th, 2021. We will email you a photo submission form upon receipt of your registration & payment. Your completed submission form must be emailed by February 28, 2021.

This 4-H activity open to all Wisconsin 4-H Club members. You may be enrolled in any 4-H project to participate. See additional guidelines and wildlife/forestry art contest rules for all classes.

"Brief Description Required" – All items must have completed the "story telling" description area (counts 30% toward award) explaining your item and its wildlife or forestry connection. Items must be made in the current 4-H project year and after September 1st of the previous year. No commercial craft kits or similar are allowed. Judges will use their own discretion and no challenges are allowed.

Limit - THREE ITEMS.

Separate Classes & Current Grade (January 2021): K5, 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, 9, 10, 11, 12, 13

1-Nesting Structure or Feeder for Bird, Bee, Butterfly, or Bat House, etc. – The structure meets specific requirements for the named critter. Include - overall size, shape, and hole diameter or opening, etc.. (Ornamental bird houses, etc. must be entered in crafts.) Include your story telling description.

2-Craft – Craft item has wildlife or forestry connection. Examples: leather craft, stitchery, clothing, sculpture, wildlife folk art, plaster tracks, quiver, etc. Craft items must be made by exhibitor during the current 4-H year. (Do not use "put together craft kits" or similar items.)

3-Drawing – Drawing can be any size and does not need to be mounted that has a wildlife, forestry, or wildlife habitat connection. Drawing can be pencil, ink, charcoal, chalk, pastel, colored pencil or similar on any surface. Drawing will be judged on "story telling ability", neatness, and your description.

4-Invasive Plant or Weed – Poster, display, or dried example of an invasive plant or weed (immature and mature if possible). Include item name, your description, and control measures. Also, include date & location where found for each item for actual collections. This entry may include items from the entire preceding calendar year. Examples: purple loosestrife, ragweed, etc. Include your story telling description.

5-Orienteering & Geocaching – Poster or display on Compass, GPS, or Topographic Map Use. Items will be judged on their relationship to wildlife or forestry applications. Poster or display related to geocaching. Include your story telling description.

6-Painting – Your painting can be any size and does not need to be mounted that has a wildlife or forestry connection. Painting can be acrylic, watercolor, oil, or similar on any surface. Painting will be judged on "story telling ability", neatness and your description.

7-Photo Black & White – Your black & white photo or silhouette photo (one photo only) can be any size and does not need to be mounted that has a wildlife or forestry connection. Photo will be judged on "story telling ability", neatness, and your description. No people allowed.

8-Photo Color – Your color photo (one only), any size, and does not need to be mounted that has a wildlife or forestry connection. Photo will be judged on "story telling ability", neatness, and your brief description. No people allowed.

9-Recycle – Any item related to wildlife, forestry, or for wildlife use. Example – bird nesting material. Item will be judged on "story telling ability", practical usefulness, neatness, and your brief description.

10-Taxidermy – Item or display made 4-H member during the current 4-H year. Include date, location, and county where critter was obtained. Also, include a description of the critter and of your taxidermy work.

11-Trail Camera Photo – Large / Small Mammal – Photo from a trail camera can be any size and does not need to be mounted. Include animal name, date, location (county), and brief description of the picture. Also include the relationship of the camera's owner. Picture must have been taken with your immediate family or grandparents trail camera after September 1st of the previous year. Photos will be judged on "story telling ability", neatness, and your description.

12-Trail Camera Photo – Upland Bird, Backyard Bird, Waterfowl, or Raptor – Photo from a trail camera can be any size and does not need to be mounted. Include animal name, date, location (county), and brief description of the picture. Also include the relationship of the camera's owner. Picture must have been taken with your immediate family or grandparents trail camera after September 1st of the previous year. Photos will be judged on "story telling ability", neatness, and your description.

13-Tree or Shrub – Item, poster or display of a tree or shrub, parts, measurements, related insects or diseases, etc. Include the tree/shrub name and description. Also, can be with an animal, insect, bird, or critter that makes their home in, on, or near a particular tree or shrub species. This entry may include items from the entire preceding calendar year.

14-WHEP or Forestry Concept – Item, diorama, poster, or display of a WHEP or forestry Concept (or part of a concept) from the current national mammals. Include the concept name and a description. Examples: habitat requirements, stages, food chain, etc.

15-WHEP Foods – Item, diorama, poster, or display of a WHEP foods (or part of a food group) from the current national WHEP mammal. Include the food group name and a description. Examples: aquatic plants, grains, soft mast, hard mast, etc.

16-WHEP or Forestry Management Practice – Item, diorama, poster, or display of a WHEP Management Practice (or part of a management practice) from the current national WHEP Mammal. Include management practice name and your description. Examples: planting trees, fish or wildlife survey, create snags, wildlife damage management, recreational uses, products, tools used, etc.

17-Wildflower – Dried or pressed wildflowers, poster or display of wildflowers or parts of a wildflower. Include name, date, location (county) where found and your description. This entry may include items from the entire preceding calendar year.

18-Wildlife/Forestry Game – Individual or group game or learning activity related to wildlife or forestry. Include name of game, supplies, rules, and ages for participation. Also, briefly describe what will be learned by the participants. Include a picture of the game being used if possible. Your item can be a 4-H youth leader activity from the entire preceding year.

- No composed or altered pictures are permitted. Judges will use their own discretion and no challenges are allowed.

- Your Wildlife or Forestry Description is Required and counts 30% toward an award" - 75 words maximum. Your description includes the correct critter name or names. You can include habitat information (diet, water & cover) and other interesting comments that tells the story about your item.
