### Fall Forum 2022

This year's fall forum will be held at Hotel Mead in Wisconsin Rapids, November 4-6th. Registration is open to all 4-H members in grades 7-12 as well as certified adult 4-H volunteers. ### 2022 4-H Stem Challenge

Kids will learn foundational STEM skills while they wrestle with the same questions as today's top oceanographers and scientists. The three activities include:

### 4-H Opportunities For Older Members

#### **Older Member Awards**

Each year our Bayfield County 4-H Leaders Association awards a variety of recognitions and travel opportunities to active 4-H members in 8th-12th grade. All Bayfield County 4-H members entering the 8th grade and up are eligible to apply. All enrolled members in this age range will be mailed and emailed applications mid-August. Applications are due September 20th, and awards will be presented at our Awards Dinner in November.

#### Travel opportunities include:

- FALL FORUM: Provides youth and adult volunteers the opportunity to learn, teach, network, and discuss critical issues and initiatives with the 4-H Youth Development program area state and local staff on policies and direction affecting Wisconsin 4-H. Award includes cost, travel, & lodging. November 2022
- CITIZENSHIP WASHINGTON FOCUS: leadership program revolves around a trip to Washington, D.C. Participants learn the importance of civic and social responsibilities as they relate to the development of better citizens and leaders. The week consists of participatory workshops, speakers, committee work, field trips, and social events. July 2023. Award covers 1/2 cost.
- AMERICAN SPIRIT TRIP EAST: opportunity for youth in grades 8-10 to develop knowledge of America's Heritage, citizenship and leadership through a 10-day educational tour of historical sites in the Eastern states, including Valley Forge, Philadelphia, New York, Boston, and Niagara Falls. Award covers 1/2 cost. June/July 2023.
- STATE 4-H YOUTH CONFERENCE: designed to help participants develop self-confidence, express and exchange ideas, increase knowledge of 4-H subjects, gain ideas for use with local 4-H programs, make new friends and experience the UW Madison campus. Up to seven Bayfield County 4-H'ers, grades 8-10, will be selected to each receive a scholarship to attend. The conference typically takes place Monday through Thursday of the third week of June. Approximately 600 youth attend this educational event in Madison each summer. Participants take part in educational seminars and assemblies and meet people from across Wisconsin. They are encouraged to take what they learn and share it with others in their home community. June 2023, Madison.
- ◆ ADVENTURE TRIP: Work with other older 4-H members to plan an outdoor adventure. The adventure could be kayaking, canoeing, rock climbing, camping, ropes courses, whitewater rafting, etc. that fits the interest of the group. The trips will be organized by the group through several planning meetings in the fall and winter of 2022 and the trip will take place sometime in 2023.

#### **4-H Family Newsletter**

NATIONAL SERVICE LEARNING CONFERENCE: This inspiring 3 day conference takes place on the University of Minnesota campus each year during the month of April. It offers youth a self-directed, facilitated learning environment with education sessions, discussion groups, & interactive workshops with a focus on service learning and current emergent issues. Youth will come out of the experience with the tools, resources, ideas, & inspiration to return home to implement positive change in their communities.

#### Member recognition awards include:

- KEY AWARD: This prestigious award provides special recognition to 4-H members in their senior year of high school who have demonstrated consistent growth in the 4-H program, developed and applied their leadership skills, and actively participated in the functions of their club and community. 4-H'ers must have completed at least three years in the program. The award is sponsored by the Wisconsin Farm Bureau Federation
- BEGINNING LEADERSHIP AWARD: This award is intended for youth in eighth grade or older who are just beginning their 4-H leadership and have demonstrated good leadership qualities.
- OUTSTANDING LEADERSHIP AWARD: This award recognizes individuals who have demonstrated consistent leadership abilities at club and county levels. Tenth grade or older will be selected and awarded a certificate of recognition.
- OUTSTANDING YOUTH PROJECT LEADER: This award recognizes individuals who have demonstrated the ability to teach younger members project-related skills.
- BEGINNING COMMUNITY SERVICE AWARD: This award recognizes members grades 8 and up who have excelled in service to their communities.
- OUTSTANDING COMMUNITY SERVICE AWARD: This award recognizes members grades 10 and up who have taken a leadership role in providing service to their community.
- LEGISLATIVE CITATION: This prestigious award recognizes an individual in 11<sup>th</sup> grade or older who has demonstrated outstanding service and leadership in their community through their 4-H involvement.
- YOUNG ENTREPRENEURSHIP AWARD: This award is intended for youth in 8th grade or older who are beginning their own small business venture.
- ADVANCED ENTREPENUERSHIP AWARD: This award recognizes an individual in 10th grade or older who has grown in their experience in running a small business.
- ◆ 4-H AMBASSADORS: Our 4-H Ambassadors are the role models of our county 4-H program. Applicants to the Ambassador program should be dedicated and ambitious 4-H members who are interested in collaborating with other county youth to improve the Bayfield County 4-H program. Ambassador duties include: reaching the public with the 4-H story, helping other 4-H'ers better understand the 4-H program , assisting with and hosting 4-H programs and events. This is a 2 year term and requires attendance Page 4 to quarterly Zoom planning and training meetings.

### My Experience on American Spirit East, by Avana Beeksma

Last October, I was awarded the American Spirit Trip East through the Older Member Award process. I was so excited to go! I spent 10 days in June traveling from city to city on the East Coast with a group of 44 youth, 8th to 12th grade, and 5 chaperones.

On Day 1 we departed Wisconsin by coach bus, and drove through the night. We slept on the bus, but I don't think much sleeping was accomplished. En route we stopped in Ohio, and the next evening we arrived in Philadelphia, PA, where we walked through the city and learned about George Washington, Benjamin Franklin, and the history of the Surgeon School, (my personal favorite) which is a famous medical school in Philadelphia. We boarded the bus again and headed to New York City!

We arrived at the hotel at about 6 pm, and split up to walk to dinner and Times Square. There were so many people! In any one place at a given time there were at least 10 types of people (Wall Street brokers, homeless people, families, high school students, etc). After Times Square we walked to the Empire State Building. Once we got to the top we could see everything! The ocean, the Brooklyn Bridge, the Statue of Liberty, and the Hudson River were some of the major landmarks. I think by far the best part was seeing NYC lit up at night.



The next day we boarded the bus and headed to Battery Park to take the ferry to the Statue of Liberty and Ellis Island. After that, we returned to Battery Park and walked to see Alexander Hamilton's grave. We took the NYC subway to Central Park, where we waited for our bus to pick us up to depart for Boston. At this point, nearly everyone was disappointed because all week we wanted to see a street rat, but one never showed. But as our bus came into view, someone yelled "Street Rat!", and there it was! We boarded the bus, and we departed NYC.

The next afternoon, after arriving in Boston, we went whale watching. We spent at least 5 hours on the boat, and we saw 5 whales! After a good night's rest, we went to see the Mayflower 2 and Quincy Market. The Mayflower 2 is a replica of the original, and was much smaller than expected. Quincy Market, on the other hand, was huge 5 On the first floor of the main building is just one huge food court, with anything from lobster to cakes to Asian cuisine. Surrounding this building were vendors selling a variety of products, from Oriental rings to Boston Massachusetts hats. There was also a candy shop, a Starbucks, a Croc's store, and more.



During our walking tour of Boston, we saw a metal donkey, and we took the photo opportunity!

Our next stop in Boston was the graves of those killed in the Salem Witch Trials of 1692. Before we arrived, I did what we called a "Teachable Moment" presentation to our group about the Salem Witch Trials. My interactive presentation included facts about the Witch Trials and included a relevant game. Afterwards, we visited the graves of the 20 people killed in the Trials. Our final stop the next day was Old Fort Niagara and Niagara Falls. Old Fort Niagara was quite the learning experience about the deplorable conditions during the war. Niagara Falls was immense! The amount of water is overwhelming, and everyone got soaked on the Maid of the Mist, a boat tour of Niagara Falls. After the Maid of the Mist, we boarded the bus and began the 13 1/2 hour drive home.

### **Entry Tips**

- Your Club Leader has received all the entry tags for your club. You will need to pick them up from him/her.
- Affix your tags to your entries with rubber bands provided. Animal entries may have their tags affixed to stalls/pens.
- Bring ALL entry tags you received to the Fair
  even if you're not entering some items.
- Give the entry tags for the items you did NOT bring to the Fair ("No Shows") to each Department Superintendent at the Fair on Thursday.
- Bring the items you are entering to the Fairgrounds on Thursday, August 11th from Noon—7\* pm. (Your exhibit/booths must be finished by 7 pm.)
- Turn in your Exhibitor Pass Voucher at the Gate on Thursday to get your season wristband.
- If you have more than 10 entries please arrive at the Exhibit Hall or Garden Building no later than 6:00 p.m. on Thursday.
- Volunteer in the Exhibit Hall/Garden Building to earn a free Season Pass for you or a family member. Go online to: <u>www.bayfieldcounty.org/fair</u>
- Learn from your experiences; Watch and listen to the judging.
- Show your entries to friends and family during the Fair.

Pick up your entries on Sunday from 5:45—7pm. The Bayfield County Fair will not be responsible for any items left after this time.
